READ 0301—College Learning Strategies

Department: The Teaching and Learning Center/Education Department

Course: READ 0301, College Learning Strategies

Textbook & Required Materials:

• *Reading Keys*, 4th Edition, by Laraine Flemming. ISBN 978-1-133-58995-2. Please note: You will need the textbook and the MindTap/College Success Toolkit access code. If you purchase the items separately, the cost will be higher than purchasing them together.

Course Description:

This course is not part of the core curriculum. This course does address South Plains College Universal Learning Outcomes in critical thinking and problem-solving, creativity, communication, collaboration, and leadership.

Prerequisites: Recommendation based on assessment

This course offers preparation for college-level reading and studying, including vocabulary development, understanding implied ideas and details, identifying author's reasoning for evaluation, and study skills. Credit will not satisfy graduation requirements but will satisfy developmental reading requirements for TSI purposes.

Course Purpose:

The purpose of this course is to provide opportunities and incentives for you to read: addressing students' individual skill deficiencies in reading as determined by TSI assessment, helping students gain reading experiences and skills, and preparing students to succeed with the reading requirements of the college curriculum and as lifelong readers/learners.

<u>Student Learning Outcomes:</u> Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to demonstrate collegiate reading skills. Students will...

- Locate explicit textual information, draw complex inferences, and describe, analyze, and evaluate the information within and across multiple texts of varying lengths;
- Comprehend and use vocabulary effectively in oral communication, reading, and writing;
- Describe, analyze, and evaluate information within and across a range of texts;
- Identify and analyze the audience, purpose, and message across a variety of texts;
- Describe and apply insights gained from reading a variety of texts.

<u>Assessment:</u> Students will demonstrate these skills by scoring 12.0 (or higher) grade equivalency score on the "Nelson Denny Reading Test" or meeting another TSI reading compliance standard.

EDUC 1100—An Introduction to Learning Frameworks

Department: The Teaching and Learning Center/Education Department Course: EDUC 1100, An Introduction to Learning Frameworks

Textbook & Required Materials:

• **Required articles**: The instructor will select a variety of required articles that deal with the brain, the science of learning, time management, study skills, and other important topics related to college success and learning.

Course Description:

This course is not part of the core curriculum. This course does address South Plains College Universal Learning Outcomes in critical thinking and problem-solving, creativity, communication, collaboration, and leadership.

This course is a study of the 1) research and theory in the psychology of learning, cognition, and motivation, 2) factors that impact learning, and 3) application of learning strategies. Theoretical models of strategic learning, cognition, and motivation serve as the conceptual basis for the introduction of college-level student academic strategies.

Prerequisites: This course is a co-requisite with READ 0301.

Course Purpose:

The purpose of this course is to prepare students for college and life success, equipped with knowledge, skills, strategies, and tools to apply to accomplish a variety of tasks in varying contexts.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to...

- Demonstrate understanding and become part of the "college-going culture";
- Achieve ownership of their educational process;
- Recognize the essential need of conscientious effort and regular attendance in college courses;
- Identify areas of personal and academic strengths and weaknesses;
- Create and implement a behavior modification plan to address weaknesses while building on strengths;
- Learn relaxation, coping mechanisms, and stress management techniques;
- Learn cognitive and metacognitive strategies to increase college academic success;
- Develop awareness of campus resources to support college success;
- Contact an advisor to develop a written degree plan/college success plan.

Assessment: Upon successful completion of this course, the first-time-in-college/first-semester student will earn a semester GPA of 2.0 or higher. The experienced college student will increase his/her GPA by at least .2.

Course Frequency and Design

This course takes place in-person. This applied course will be designed as a workshop-based class, with hands-on exercises and in-class projects used in almost every class meeting. Instructional methods to be used in this course will include lectures, class/large group discussion, small group discussion, individual and group activities, small group activities, student presentations, visual aids, instructor modeling of concepts and ideas, role play, and guest lectures.

Your class is broken out into distinct activities. These activities include:

- In-Class Activities and Participation
- Paper-based assignments and Quizzes
- Digital homework
- Exams

In-class Activities and Participation – Worth 10% of your grade

Critical components of this course are classroom discussions, participation, and applied in-class activities. These hands-on assignments and exercises will be conducted in class so that you have instructor and peer guidance throughout all elements of the reading, vocabulary, and comprehension processes. These activities count towards your participation grade in this class and cannot be made-up if you are absent from class.

The instructor will collect in-class assignments from time to time throughout the semester to provide meaningful, frequent, and timely feedback, as well as to assess students' understanding of reading skills. These in-class activities will count towards the participation grade. Therefore, please plan on having paper and pens/pencils with you in every class to complete these in-class assignments.

***Please note: In-class activities <u>cannot be made up for credit</u> if you miss a class. If you miss a class, you will be given a grade of 0 for that day's participation grade. However, you should consult with the instructor, as well as classmates, to obtain copies of handouts and other material(s) distributed in class.

Paper Based Assignments and Quizzes– Worth 25% of your grade

Paper based assignments must be typed in a recognized work-processing software (such as Word, or Pages for MAC), OR handwritten clearly and neatly.

In addition to digital homework, you will have paper-based assignments. These are designed to reinforce the concepts learned in class and practiced in MindTap. Assignments must be submitted on the date the assignment is due, even if you will be out. These assignments will be announced in class, and posted under in Blackboard.

- When typing up your assignments, **please use a clean font** (e.g., Times New Roman, Comic Sans, Calibri) in a size of 10, 11, or 12 point.
- Assignments must be turned in on the date the assignment is due, at the start of class, unless otherwise noted. Failure to turn in an assignment/complete an assignment will result in a zero (0) for that assignment.
- Please **use a recognized word processing software system** (such as Microsoft Word, or Pages for MAC). I must be able to open, save, and download attachments.
- It is expected that students will use professional and appropriate language, which includes correct grammar, complete sentences, and proofreading all assignments prior to submission. Failure to use these elements may result in a deduction in points for assignments.

Quizzes: You will be expected to complete weekly (sometimes daily) quizzes on each chapter you are reading in your textbooks. Your quiz will also include material from EDUC1100 – My College Success Toolkit information, in MindTap. Your quizzes will be completed in class, and will cover material that you were expected to read and/or material discussed in class, completed on assignments, and/or MindTap homework.

- Quizzes may not be made up. If you miss a quiz, a grade of 0 will be entered into the grade book in Blackboard.
- In the case of a metacognitive prompt/writing prompt/open ended question, it is expected that students will use professional and appropriate language, which includes correct grammar and complete sentences. Failure to use these elements may result in a deduction in points on these reflective questions on quizzes.
- A student may drop his or her lowest chapter quiz grade/hw grade at the end of the semester. Grade drops and any bonus points will be applied AFTER the final exam.

<u>Digital Homework – Worth 25% of your grade</u>

In this class, you will have a series of digital homework assignments.

Some will be "active reading" assignments, where you will read a chapter, and complete digital versions of chapter exercises in the textbook.

Some activities will be skill-building exercises, assessments, and journals.

- You will have digital assignments weekly; these will be due by 11:59p.m. on the designated date listed in MindTap for each assignment.
- It is your responsibility to locate a computer and Internet connection to complete your assignments.

 Computer labs are available throughout the campus at different times; please be sure to identify where these are located and hours of operation, should you need to utilize on-campus computer labs.
- Failure to complete any digital assignment will result in a grade of zero (0) for each missed assignment (UNLESS the assignment is marked as "practice/not graded."). If you are having trouble with the digital homework portal (called MindTap), it is your responsibility to contact support and report the problem within 2 business days of the issue. Then, you will need to email Mrs. Satterwhite with the case number/support ticket number. Support information is located in the Blackboard course, and on the cengagebrain.com (log-in) website
- You will be given a free, 2-week trial access to MindTap at the very beginning of the semester. After that, you must enter your purchased access code to continue working in MindTap. Failure to purchase and/or enter the access code will result in you missing graded assignments, and you will be given zeroes (0s) for any missed assignments.

Exams – Worth 40% (4 X10% of each) of your grade

You will have four (4) exams throughout the semester, covering concepts learned in your readings from the textbook, articles, in-class activities, paper-based assignments, and digital homework. Exam dates are listed in the tentative schedule (below). Exams take place in-class, during the regular course time, except for Exam 4/Final exam. Please consult the South Plains College final exam schedule for the exact date and time for the final exam.

- Exams may not be made up. However if you miss a major exam, you will be required to take the final exam and it will count twice. This option is only available for one exam.
- At the instructor's discretion, and based on course performance (digital homework, exams, quizzes, paper-based assignments, in-class activities), the final exam may be optional for students who have an A or B average at the end of the semester. However, if a student with an A or B average has missed a <u>major exam</u>, he/she will need to take Exam 4/Final exam.
- Exams will cover the material included in the chapters of the text(s), as well as EDUC1100 material discussed in class and read about in MindTap (digital homework portal) and as indicated on the schedule (below). This may include concepts discussed in class, concepts read in specific chapters covered in the books, concepts covered in your quizzes, homework, and/or assignments. Please do not assume that if a concept in the textbook has not been covered in class, it will not be on the exam!!
- Grade drops and any bonus points will be applied AFTER the final exam.

The intention of the master syllabus is to provide an outline of the contents of this course, as specified by faculty of the Reading Department at South Plains College, regardless of who teaches the course, when it is taught or where it is taught. Faculty members teaching this course for South Plains College are expected to facilitate learning pursuant to the course objectives. However, instructors also are encouraged to cover additional topics of interest so long as those topics are relevant to the course's subject. The master syllabus is, therefore, prescriptive in nature but also allows for a diversity of individual approaches to course material.
